### **International Female Ride Day (IFRD)**

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As well as writing ride blogs for our Chapter I occasionally enjoy doing some research on motorcycle related subjects. With this I am also endeavouring to make our Chapter Hoggies the best informed bikers on motorcycle trivia! So read on to improve your biker IQ and enjoy this article about "International Female Ride Day".

This article is based on research through Google and Google Images and includes 47 downloaded images. As a fellow motorcycle enthusiast I am sure you will find this to be an interesting read! This article is for entertainment purposes only.

International Female Ride Day (IFRD) is dedicated to rejoicing women on motorcycles and is celebrated annually worldwide on the first Saturday of May. The day spotlights and promotes female riders of all ages, and is not country, group or organisation specific, but is an all brands and all styles of motorcycles event which extends across all borders and cultures of the world. It's primarily neither a charity run, nor a contest but some organised rides do fund-raisers for chosen charities. It is the biggest ladies-only motorcycling event in the world.

International Female Ride Day is the sole creation of Toronto (Canada) resident Vicki Gray who started IFRD in the year 2007 as a way to raise awareness of female motorcyclists and to encourage more women to adopt and embrace the two-wheel lifestyle. It also marks a call to action for fast-tracking gender equality, awareness, acceptance, and respect for women in motorcycling. Gray describes it as "a global synchronized ride day for women, unified in the passion for motorcycling – across all borders and languages".

Vicki has stated "Motorcycling is my life's passion as well as my life's work" and "IFRD provides a platform for women motorcycle riders to meet like-minded women with which to enjoy motorcycling". She launched IFRD in Toronto, Canada in the year 2007, the only global women's motorcycle ride event which has become the strongest women's motorcycle movement in history.

IFRD began as a national event and instantly went global right from its inaugural year. It just caught fire and went across the border to the USA, The Netherlands, and Australia and it continues to spread its tentacles worldwide and is now in over 120 countries. It is a fixture in countries including France, England, Greece, Russia, Poland, Serbia, India, Hungary, Ireland, South Africa, Brazil, Bulgaria, the Caribbean, China, Colombia, the Czech Republic, Egypt, Germany, Iceland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Kuwait, Mexico, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Sweden, Thailand and in dozens of centres across the United States, including Alaska and Hawaii. And many more are being added to the list. Now more than a decade later, it has become permanently etched into every woman rider's agenda for the first Saturday in May. Each year "the movement" continues to expand and grow to such an extent that it truly has a unique global status. It is the largest all inclusive, borderless campaign for female motorcyclists of its kind in the world. Since its inception, IFRD has been a great source of pride for female motorcyclists.

#### So who is this Vicki Gray you ask! Let's investigate her further.

Just looking at a few highlights of her accredited bio, Vicki Gray is a globally recognised motorcycling instructor, road racer (she raced in the Supersport 600 throughout Europe) and advocate for fun, safe motorcycling and founder of MOTORESS, the motorcycling lifestyle magazine. Her life is fully submerged in motorcycling and she's as passionate about the sport today as the day she first began to ride! She also co-hosted a television program for the Discovery Channel.

MOTORESS had its start in 1998 when Vicki Gray created the first ever online website for women in motorsport with the purpose to encourage greater awareness of women in motorcycling globally. MOTORESS is a global motorcycle resource for women providing on-line articles and workshops to encourage women, enhance skills and continue to expand the female riding community. MOTORESS has established itself as a world renowned motorcycling lifestyle community and motorcycle resource. MOTORESS supports, educates and encourages the motorcycle lifestyle through content that's relevant to women and to the riding enthusiast. MOTORESS provides an insider's guide to a rider's lifestyle helping you to get all you need to enjoy motorcycling to its fullest. MOTORESS.com is produced by Vicki Gray who is passionate about motorcycling, riding well, motonews, motorcycling culture, and how it all fits into the life of the modern woman and rider.

Women motorcycle enthusiasts can subscribe to MOTORESS by going to motoress.com where they say "The more you know, the better it gets".

Image 4 – IFRD is always a globally synchronized action on the first Saturday in May and is in fact the world's largest organized women's motorcycling event. This is the 14th consecutive year of the ride and for the year 2020 it was to occur on Saturday May 2, BUT due to the current COVID-19 pandemic, it has been postponed for this year only to Saturday 22 August in the hope that by then we will have surpassed this pandemic. This is for the safety and health of all so as to not put anyone or their friends and loved ones at risk.



Image 5 – IFRD is far too important an action for women in motorcycling to not have it occur in 2020 so it has been rescheduled worldwide to Saturday, 22 August, 2020. Thus the globally synchronized "JUST RIDE" day should still go ahead providing the pandemic is by then controlled, contained and behind us.



<u>Image 6</u> - Women feel a sense of empowerment and pure exhilaration in the freedom riding brings to their lives. Research shows that women find riding as a "form of therapy"; a way to break free from the pressures and obligations that so many women face today as working mothers, executives in business, care-givers, wives etc. Often women leave personal pleasure like motorcycling last on their list but the JUST RIDE day invites all women to join together on one globally synchronized day. The role and effect IFRD has played in encouraging women in motorcycling and expanding their numbers remains unsurpassed. IFRD continues to achieve respect and acknowledgement the world over while breaking down barriers for women.

Due to its growing popularity, IFRD has now started to attract support from motorcycle manufacturers such as Harley-Davidson, BMW, Honda, Kawasaki, Suzuki, Yamaha, and Ducati – North America.

While we consider women to be equal to men when it comes to riding a motorcycle, we also recognize that women are still a minority in the sport, though continually growing in numbers. Their numbers are steadily increasing, and certainly more so in recent decades. Including pillion passengers, now nearly 25% of motorcycle users are women. Whether it is for spirituality, confidence, strength or community, the number of women motorcyclists is increasing year by year.

The IFRD JUST RIDE day is to promote and highlight women riders with their shared passion for motorcycling. It is all about riding in celebration, unity and support.

IFRD invites women to be on a motorcycle and it's their choice what to do from there. To participate in IFRD you just need to ride on the ride day, anywhere in the world, be it on your own, with friends, as part of a special event, or rally, or fund raiser or just riding to work. This ride can be for an hour, an afternoon, or the full day, whatever! The day is free to make it as you wish — "JUST RIDE!" It isn't surprising, however, that many organised rides have a charity fund-raiser theme. And you don't need to register to participate, "JUST RIDE!" Many riders partner up with their local motorcycle dealership or just start a Facebook group to gather riders in their area.

As expected, there are many organised rides and meet ups, even huge local events initiated by different clubs, dealerships or manufacturers. Many such events take place around the world. You can decide to join in or just ride alone — it is totally your decision. How you enjoy your day is entirely up to you. The important part of IFRD is that you get out there and ride showing that woman riders are out there in force, in a synchronized ride! It is also important that this ride day is advertised as the IFRD and nothing else.

To participate you will obviously need access to a motorcycle (your own, or borrowed or rented) or even participate as a pillion passenger. Women of all ages and backgrounds are welcome.




